## Reimagining our learning and community spaces

To best serve U of T Dentistry's students—and our surrounding community—we must revitalize our physical fabric, from state-of-the-art learning environments that reflect the realities of the dental profession today to welcoming, flexible clinical spaces where we can provide excellent and accessible care to those who need it most.

Since dentistry is a hands-on profession, students must learn in clinical environments that replicate those they'll encounter in their future careers.

Such cutting-edge teaching facilities are also an essential draw for talent and help us attract top students to U of T's Faculty of Dentistry. We are committed to offering them the best learning experiences possible, including significant experiential training opportunities with the latest dental tools and technologies, so that they can, in turn, provide the very best care in the communities they will go on to serve.

The COVID-19 pandemic also taught us the importance of flexible spaces. Our open-air clinics had to close temporarily as a precautionary health measure during the worst of the pandemic, disrupting our patients' access to oral health care. In response, we created a satellite clinic with 41 fully enclosed operatories that served the needs of our patients and our students—and kept them safe.

This adaptive move has also made it possible for us to begin renovating our Pre-Clinical Simulation Lab and consider upgrades for our largest patient clinic, known as Clinic 2, so that we never have to close down our clinics again.

With your support, we can seize this opportunity to modernize our highest-impact spaces, bring them up to today's professional standards, act on our learnings from the COVID-19 pandemic—and be ready for whatever the future brings.

## As part of our campaign, we are seeking support for the following spaces:

- Pre-Clinical Simulation Lab, where our students begin their training and hone their skills, its Digital Dentistry Lab and individual stations and simulators within the SimLab
- Clinic 2, our largest clinic serving thousands of patients each year, and individual operatories within the clinic
- Dental Patient Reception Lobby, the high-traffic gateway to the Faculty

- Satellite Clinic at 777 Bay Street, which allowed us to reopen our community clinic services during the pandemic, and individual operatories within the clinic
- Auditorium, where the U of T Dentistry community can learn and network
- The Faculty of Dentistry Library, where our community acquires knowledge, collaborates and discovers

## Pre-Clinical Simulation Lab

Leveraging state-ofthe-art technology, the revitalized Pre-Clinical SimLab at U of T Faculty of Dentistry will allow students to build their confidence and competence with the latest tools in dentistry—before they treat patients. The Pre-Clinical Simulation
Lab, currently known as Lab 4,
is a crucial training space for
first- and second-year Doctor
of Dental Surgery students
at the University of Toronto's
Faculty of Dentistry. It allows
them to develop their skills
before they treat patients in the
later years of their program.
Learners can practice and
repeat techniques as often as
necessary to fine-tune their
capabilities, ultimately leading
to better clinical outcomes.

Built in 1959, the SimLab requires significant upgrades to ensure it can meet the needs of learners today and tomorrow. These critical updates include outfitting the lab's original wood cabinets with materials better suited for infection control and acquiring new equipment such as state-of-the-art simulators and a computerized chart and x-ray system.

These new tools will help students develop their clinic management and interpretative skills. Each new patient simulator will feature LED lighting, a computer screen and full access to a clinical management system, ambidextrous handpieces and suction, an operator's stool and lab bench, and a mannequin torso equipped with a typodont (a model of a human mouth containing plastic teeth). These units are mechanically identical to those found in dental clinics and will help ensure a seamless transition for our students from their training to real-world practice.

Your support can ensure we give students hands-on experience with these state-of-the-art tools, preparing them to deliver excellent patient care when they transition to the clinic and secure the best possible patient outcomes.

## Digital Dentistry Lab within the Pre-Clinical SimLab

Dental education has long relied on plaster and acrylic moulds to teach students. However, these tools are increasingly being replaced by more flexible and modern digital dentistry and CAD/ CAM (computer-aided design/computer-aided manufacturing) modelling technologies. As these digital tools become the industry standard, it is crucial that the Faculty also offer students experience with these technologies.

With your support, the Faculty plans to enhance the Pre-Clinical SimLab's current support laboratories—including the existing casting room, polishing room, and process and knock-out room—by adding new Digital Dentistry Lab spaces. Your support will help us give students direct experience with these digital dentistry techniques.



#### Clinic 2: U of T Faculty of Dentistry's largest patient clinic



This crucial space is improving the health of a vast and diverse population in the Greater Toronto Area and beyond—but it's well overdue for an upgrade, especially after the COVID-19 pandemic.

Clinic 2 is the largest clinic at the University of Toronto's Faculty of Dentistry. It offers substantially reduced rates to patients, making oral health care much more accessible to underserved populations, including the "working poor," seniors and new Canadians. It is also where our students develop their professional and clinical skills as they provide this critical care to the community.

To fully meet the growing needs of the community and our learners, the Faculty urgently needs to renew and reconfigure Clinic 2. While the clinic has had various equipment upgrades, our community outreach programming is rapidly outgrowing its capacity. The clinic's completely open-concept design has also proved vulnerable to public health emergencies like the COVID-19 pandemic, which suspended treatments in this important community space.

A revitalized clinic will offer greater privacy, better patient flow, higher efficiency and modernized learning spaces. Of vital importance, it will also help the Faculty deliver care to thousands of patients, many of whom are from vulnerable populations.

Working with a leading architecture firm, Montgomery Sisam, we have developed plans for both an open concept design and some partially enclosed operatories to allow for the greatest flexibility and continuation of patient care.

With your support, we can undertake this renewal, which will allow us to care for people in contemporary and inviting spaces and enable positive student learning experiences that better prepare tomorrow's dentists for what they will encounter in their practices.

## **Dental Patient Reception Lobby**

U of T's Faculty of Dentistry sees 15,000 patients through more than 93,000 appointments annually. By renovating our reception lobby, we can welcome them in a beautiful and modern space—and boost the efficiency of our clinic.

The Patient Reception
Lobby is the main greeting
space for the more than
15,000 annual patients who
visit the Faculty of Dentistry
at the University of Toronto.
Many of these patients do not
have regular access to dental
care, so making them feel
comfortable and cared for from
the moment they arrive is a
top priority for the Faculty. But
our current patient reception
area is in urgent need of an
upgrade.

The renewal and beautification of our Patient Reception Lobby will take place alongside the renovation planned for Clinic 2. This co-ordinated renovation will include a patient education and consultation room, where students can have private conversations with their patients in a space suitable for informative and sensitive discussions.

As the primary entry point into the Faculty, the renewed Patient Reception Lobby will help us make the community feel welcome. The renovation will also streamline moving patients from intake to care. The lobby will be home to our donor wall, showcasing the philanthropists who generously support the Faculty. In addition, the refreshed lobby will be used to host social activities and events.

## Satellite Dentistry Clinic at 777 Bay Street



U of T Faculty of Dentistry's newest clinic allowed us to reopen our public services during the COVID-19 pandemic, ensuring we could continue providing accessible care to those who need it most.

The Faculty of Dentistry at the University of Toronto recently created a Satellite Clinic at 777 Bay Street that builds on our extensive clinical operations and educational excellence. This essential expansion, which we expect to use for the next decade or more, is allowing us to complete extensive renovations at the Faculty's 124 Edward Street location.

The more than 15,000-squarefoot clinic is a beautiful. modernized space with 41 new, fully enclosed operatories. Every operatory is equipped with an automated dental line cleaning system: a standard dental chair with bottled water delivery. an operator's stool and an assistant's stool; a full-length counter and cabinet; a computer that runs axiUm, the leading academic dental software in North America; and a handwashing sink.

First- and second-year Doctor of Dental Surgery students assist in the Satellite Clinic, while third- and fourth-year students provide the primary care there. The community focus of the space provides a rich learning environment for these students, where they can hone their technical skills as well as their communication and professional skills as they provide care to those

who need it most. The clinic serves thousands of patients annually, many of whom are from underserved populations, including the "working poor" and new Canadians.

The Faculty is seeking a lead donor to champion this beautiful new clinic, which is pivotal to our success while long-term renovations take place on Edward Street. ## Auditorium: A centrepiece of U of T Dentistry

## Faculty of Dentistry Library
